The early days in Swansea

Albert William Dilger, known as Bert was born on 8 June 1888 and raised in Swansea. He was the eldest of eight children and enjoyed his sport especially football.

Bert studied at the local school and then trained as a bridge builder for a local contractor including for some time with his younger brother Harry who also served on the Western Front with the Australian Imperial force in World War 1.

Bert played in the Swansea football premiership team of 1905 and was often named amongst the best players and for a time was the secretary of the Swansea football club. He was known to enjoy fishing and according to research was a member of the Swansea Homing Society.

Bert was the son of Mary Elizabeth and William (Will) Dilger. Sadly Bert's father Will Dilger died unexpectedly on 21 February 1906 at the age of 42 in Boobyalla near Ringarooma where he had been working. He apparently died of an epileptic fit. Soon after his death and again sadly a fire broke out in the Dilger's home in Swansea and it was badly damaged. Although some of the children were in bed at the time and had to be rescued, all members of the family survived. The Launceston Daily Telegraph of 6 April 1906 stated the sympathy of the whole community is with them in their trouble, as it is only a short time ago since they were deprived of their bread winner. Mrs Dilger and family heartily assisted to save her place. Although all the clothes were destroyed, with flour, sugar, and all other kitchen necessities, had it been a windy night it would have been more serious."

Enlistment, early action and injury

Bert enlisted on 9 July 1915 at the age 27 years and departed from Tasmania to Adelaide and arrived in Alexandria, Egypt in January 1916 and following a few months in training arrived on the Western Front in France. Like many other soldiers and due to the weather conditions he soon caught the flu and was hospitalised. Bert joined the 12th Battalion which was made up of mostly Tasmanians.



On 24 July 1916 Bert was wounded in action in France receiving gunshot wounds in his back and right arm and was hospitalised in the Third Western General Hospital at Cardiff, Wales. When the hospital closed in 1919 the patients were 50% orthopaedic and 50% mentally ill patients. He then spent further time convalescing at the Woodcote Park Convalescent Hospital at Epsom, Surrey. The Woodcote Park Convalescent Hospital at its peak held over 4000 patients. He returned to training at Perham Downs in 1917 while still recovering from his wounds.

At the end of November 1916 Bert caught mumps and was hospitalised in France before being discharged 2 days before Christmas. Sadly in January 1917 he was again injured, this time receiving a severe shrapnel wound to his right arm and was sent to England to the Horton County of London war hospital. He again returned to Perham Downs camp for training purposes and rehabilitation. Bert received the sad news that his younger brother Harry was killed in action in Armentieres, Belgium on 31 January 1917. Harry was just 19 years old.

In March 1917 on his return to the Western Front, Bert was transferred from the 12th Battalion to the 69th Battalion and was promoted to Lance Corporal. He returned to the 12 Battalion in November 1917.

On 9 January 1918 Bert suffered gunshot wounds to his legs and face and was again hospitalised but was soon reclassified as fit for elementary field work and re-joined the training school, and then soon returned to active duty.

Bravery and Berts military medal at Messines, France

On 16 Feb 1918 Bert was awarded the military medal for bravery.

The commendation read as follows:

On the night of the 9th/10th January 1918 east of Messines, Lance Corporal A.W Dilger was in charge of a patrol. They got within 20 yards of an enemy post and were heavily bombed. Lance Corporal Dilger was wounded through the ankle, which was broken, and Private R.T Hortle was badly wounded in the thigh. The remainder of the patrol, wounded in a lesser degree, returned to our lines.

Lance Corporal Dilger remained with Hortle and carried him back, a distance of about 90 yards, and was subjected to heavy rifle and machine gun fire in doing so. Undoubtedly Private Hortle owes his life to Lance Corporal Dilger's gallant action.

Bert Dilger's military medal is held in the Swansea Historical Rooms (part of the East Coast Heritage Museum and Glamorgan Spring Bay Historical Society Inc.) The medal was donated by his niece Marge Bouchard, who apparently inherited it from his two sisters, Kit and Nell Dilger.

Killed in action and a mother's pain.

Sadly Bert was killed in action at the age of 29 years just 3 months later on 31 May 1918 and was buried at the Borre Cemetery in France. (It should be noted many thousands of Australian soldiers still have no known gravesite.)

The then Glamorgan Council moved a special motion in his honour which reads:

At the meeting of the Glamorgan council last week the Warden, Mr A. J. Amons moved "That a letter be forwarded to Mrs E. Dilger sympathising with her in the great loss she has sustained through the death of her other son, Albert William, who was recently killed in

action in France, and that is be placed on record the high esteem that the Council entertained for

Bert's mother Mrs Mary Dilger was offered a public ceremony for the presentation of Bert's military medal but responded as follows: "I will be greatly obliged if you will post the medal direct to me as I have not desire whatever for a public presentation".

It is with feelings of admiration at the gallantry of a brave Australian soldier who nobly laid down his life in the service of our King and Country, that I am directed by the Honourable The Minister to forward to you, as the legatee of the late No. 2452 Lance Corporal A.T. Dilger, M.M., 12th Battalion, Australian Imperial Force, the Military Wedal which his Majesty the King has been graciously pleased to award to that gallant soldier for conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty while serving with the Australian Imperial Expeditionary Force.

I am sloo to ask you to accept his deep personal sympathy in the loss which, not only you, but the Australian Army has sustained by the death of Lance Corporal Dilger whose magnificent conduct on the field of battle helped to earn for our Australian soldiers a fame which will endure as long as memory lasts.

I shall be obliged if you will kindly let me know whether it comes safely to hand by signing and returning the attached receipt slip.

In his personal possession on the western front were a wallet, photos, a prayer book, 10 cards, a brownie camera and a sewing kit. Mrs Mary Dilger was subsequently sent a mothers and widows badge with 2 stars, one for each of her sons – Albert William Dilger and Harry Clarence Dilger.

On behalf of the Swansea Returned and Services League Sub-Branch, I am honoured to provide a brief statement on the occasion of commemorating our townsman, Albert William Dilger, late of the 12th Battalion, 1st Australian Imperial Force.

The Dilger name itself is well-established in the Swansea district. Indeed it was prominent on the outbreak of the First World War with several members of the family enlisting. Albert, or Bert as he was universally known, joined in July of 1915; at the relative old age of 27, listing his profession as bridge builder. He was 5' 8" tall, with a dark complexion reminiscent of his family. He embarked for France and was wounded on several occasions – at the very least three – and proved an able soldier with a promotion to Lance Corporal. Less a brief stint in the 69th Battalion, Bert served exclusively in the might "Blue and White" of the 12th – Tasmania's own.

In early 1918, Bert was awarded the Military Medal for gallantry – a feat that was no doubt talked about in the local township for some months. Of course, as is the brutal nature of war his pride was short-lived, as he was killed in action only three months later.

Today, Bert is commemorated on our town's memorial with other sons, fathers and brothers who bore the supreme sacrifice. As we approach ANZAC Day, the timing of this correspondence is most meaning for it reminds us all that Bert and his comrades will never be forgotten. Indeed, as the Ode reminds us, "... at the going down of the sun, and in morning, we will remember Them."

Mr Barnett, as you embark on this important task, let me thank you for this invitation in letting me, on behalf of the townspeople of Swansea, give such remembrance. Let Bertie know that he is his memory, his actions and deeds, and his sacrifice is not lost on us. We revere him and he is contained within our collective prayers.

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

I am sending a feew lines to let you know that I am alright. I have just about got over the sea-sickness we have had a pretty rough trip and all hands have been bad, but all are getting lively again. I will start and tell you what bit of news there is to tell since we left Melbourne. We left Melbourne Tuesday 10th at 3oclock and had a rough trip round to Adelaide one night was very rough we had thunder & lightening the ship got 20 miles out of its course but after we arrived at Adelaide on Thursday 12th at 1 oclock and left for Fremantle @ 7 oclock the same day and are still on the way. I think we should get there on Tuesday morning. When I say Adelaide I mean Port Adelaide, the City is 10 miles further on and I don't think the Big boats can get up. They are terrible grabbers at Port A.. the used to charge us tip-top prices for anything we bought oranges that we can buy for 1d each on the ship they used to charge us 4 for 6d. one of the boys that was selling on the wharf told us that they put 2d per bottle on the cordials while the soldiers were there I don't reckon that very patriotic do you. I hope they let us ashore at Fremantle we will have been on board a week then. One good thing there is plenty good tucker on board we get meat 3 times a day and at 7 oclock in the evening we get biscuits and cheese.

I got a parcel from you on Tuesday, thank you very much for the good things that were in it, everything was in good order. I got a letter from you and Nell, also from Kit & Ella and one from Iris all were written in the first week in March I suppose Harry will have left Tasmania long before you get this letter, there will not be many chaps left in Swansea if they keep on coming at the rate they are doing so now. We are beginning to get some lovely weather here now, the last 4 or 5 days it has just been like early summer in Tassie, it reminds me a lot of Tasmania at times and especially now all the fruit trees are coming out in bloom. You see a lot of funny things here sometimes, they train Dogs here to work at all sorts of things you often go along here & see a dog dragging a small cart about. I sent you some P.Cs the other day I hope you get them. Oh, next time you write tell me how the elections got on, I might not see the paper with it in. Just a few lines to let you know that I am still in the hospital and doing well. I got up on Friday and I am in a hut out side and I am in with old Sid Morey is hear with me. I hope to be going out to join my unit on Saturday and I wont be sorry. It is very cold down hear now we have had a few very rough days lately but it seemed if it is going to clear up a bit now and I hope it does. The mumps are not to bad to get once in a way because it is a good spell and I never had them very bad. I suppose you are starting to have some hot weather in Australia by now and we are starting to cop the cold over hear. I got a letter from Norman Balett yesterday and he said that he saw Bert last Wednesday and he was very well. I reckon he was over at my Camp yesterday but the other boy would be looking out for him. About a fortnight ago Norman Balett cousin got word that he was kill so you can imagine how xxx he will feel when I tell him that he is still going. There was an axident out hear this morning. There was a flying machine flying about a ¼ of a mile away from us and something went wrong with the machine and he fell and was killed we could see the machine falling from where we are. I hope to get some letters from home today the boys will send them to me from camp.

My Dear Mum

Here I am again just going to send you a few lines to let you know that I am getting along alright and hoping you and all at home are well and cheering up alright. I have had a few more letters during the last week (Dec letters), I have also had a letter from Will and find that he is in England for a few months, I was very pleased to hear that he has won the Military Medal, I wonder what he got it for, and talking about Military Medals Dear Mum, I must tell you that I have been lucky enough to win that honour, I expect you will have received word about it before you get this note I don't know if you will be told by them what I got it for so I will tell you in this note. You will remember me telling you some time ago about having a patrol out and getting into a bit of trouble, I had 3 men with me at the time and when we struck the enemy one poor chap got terribly wounded, the other two got away one of them slightly wounded, I got a few scratches also and stayed close to the lad that could not get away, then got him on my back and crawled away with him until I got far enough from Fritz to get up on my feet, and then carried him to our wire and went and got stretcher bearers, who helped me to get him through the wire, I am very sorry to say that the poor lad has since died of his wounds, one of his legs was almost blown off. I am sending the Order that I got yesterday as I cannot take care of it here. You often ask in your letters if I received the money you sent me, but I hope you have received my letters telling you that I got it alright and thank you very much Dear, I am trying to add a few more pounds to it and get leave to Paris. I have not been able to get any further information about poor Fred and Ted yet but will do so as soon as I can.


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
