What do you do at kitchen?:

PH:

Feed up to 500 people a week

People doing it tough, the homeless

People who are lonely

Clothes, everything in kitchen is free

People come in broken, tearing up

We support them

Not Government funded

Hope Church is his rock

They support him emotionally, spiritually, financially

No one here paid

He also puts in help for people like lawn moving, fix stuff

He likes to help people

His whole life revolves around this

Had 150 people come in yesterday for brekkie, lunch and dinner

Fruit fly causes problems:

G:

A side issue is backpackers coming in needing a hand

Clothing, food, acomm

If they are not getting work, that's one of the things we work to do

Impacted by fruit fly issue:

PH:

Yes

Many people come for fruit picking

A lot of them coming in doing it tough

Can't get the work

Not sure how that works as fruit still there on trees

A lot of people living on streets

They can't work, so they come here to eat, clothes

What can we do?:

Exactly what we are doing

Be there, love and care for the people

Help fed them, encourage them

Give them a place where they can come and sit down and talk

It is happening weekly, not just because of fruit fly

We are small org with big heart

We are there for them

Knows of some fellows who had to leave, go to Shepparton to pick fruit as there is no work here How to you operate:

Through donations from church

Someone from church lease him a Toyota

Where are you, some people ask if they can volunteer:

G:

Always can use more volunteers

Always welcome them

PH:

15 Fenton St, Devonport

G:

Broader policy issues - housing?:

Rental pressure definite flow-on effect

We are seeing it in the kitchen

They are not homeless, but they need help being fed, fed the kids

They can also share some of the struggle here

Next power bill?:

We rely on a bit of faith

He probably made a bit more of an issue than what it should have been

By mentioning it to people who said just let us know

He did that, but never go any help

It is a struggle

Rely on just donations through the church

Secondbite also support him

Wants to try an deduct a bit from the kitchen money each week to prepay, but doesn't know

Nick Hanson, Fruit growers Tasmania:

Re fruit fly issue as far as work goes for backpackers

Does not think this is the case

Some apple orchards still yet to start picking

There should be no difference whatsoever

Fruit has to be picked

It can be sold, it is being sold

It goes through a process

But should be no difference whatsoever

Moving through zone is more difficult, but that is after fruit has been harvested

For people to go to the kitchen and say the work is not there, that is not essentially true

Some farmers despairing, excluded from traditional market?:

No, not seeing that

We work very closely with all affected famers

Government's business package is making up for price differential

Government has been fantastic

Package there to keep people picking fruit

We sell in Victoria at the moment

People still picking, packing, driving tractors

Everyone is still earning a dollar

That is what Government package is there to do
Nothing has changed
Maybe the odd small grower, but very, very, very small percentage not able to harvest
Business as usual
But main harvesting still two weeks away

Impact on Tasmania?

Wayne Bould, CEO, Minerals Council:

What could it mean?:

flow-on effect rather than direct effect

None of our major producers supply US directly

Perhaps Tempco with manganese

We are predominantly China-directed

If Chinese manufacturers affected there will be flow on to us

But at the moment unclear how changes would be implemented

Mackenzie said unsure how BHP would be affected

Same applies to most producers in Tasmania

Republican statement suggesting Section 2/32 might be relevant but should be directed to certain countries, not catchall

Has no idea what Trump thinking is

Produce too much steel in China and then dup it in US

But why he is doing this, wouldn't know

Aluminium from Bell Bay?:

Double edged sword

Next door best customer, Ecca?, rest goes to Asia as high quality product

In large part completed product

Should not be any direct impact

Lower prices?:

Prices set in London

Asian exchanges

They mostly forward sell

As soon as it looks bad they push number down for future purchases

Urged people to vote for Majority Govt, many interpreted as voting Liberal, your reflection?:

His signature in letter, and does not think it was implied as Liberal vote, was apolitical, just call for Majority Government Have no bias

Now have stable Govt hopefully to progress forward

Still moving largely from election to election

Means moving from one promise to another

Short-term views instead of long-term views

Outlooks to look forward 15-20yrs – what steps do we need to take

That seems to be missing

A lot of largesse from both parties at elections

What appears to be buckets of money, unsubstantiated

But where will Tas be in 15-20yrs

A future for our kids and grandkids, stop his moving to Canada, we need strategies

How coherent our forward planning to mineral exploration and discovery in N and NW- wilderness?:

Have seen amazing increase in exploration in last twelve month

Showing very good sign people have interest in Tasmania again

Part of it engendered by stable Government focussed on delivering approvals

Will always have an issue

Always tension between ecology and long-term views about extracting mining

Over 150 mines in that area since mid 1800s

World centre for nips for pens in 1850s

Goes back a long way

But very difficult to find some of the mines

With sensitive approach a balance can be achieved

Can generate income

But most fundamental part is value-adding before sending it offshore

NEM decoupling dramatic fall in wholesale prices?:

It's about a strategy

They made a pretty sound one before cable broke

Should be benchmarking our prices to small and medium businesses and large industrials against international pricing Thinks it would work well in Tasmania's favour if we do it properly

And get smart and use surplus power to export into NSW and SA markets

Important strategy for Tasmania to look at

Justin McErlain, Coastal Pods, Wynyard:

Housing crisis – some people suggested shipping containers could be answer - how easy to convert a container?:

Converting containers into accomm much easier than decades ago

Done a lot around the world

Straightforward

Often quicker building than conventional house

How quick?:

To liveable house probably about 12-14 weeks

Need the big containers

Ours are two containers, equivalent to 3bedroom house

Cost?:

Looking at \$130,000 to \$150,000, subject to council costs

Massively cheaper

Options are there

Matter of finding good partners who are able to do it

Advantages of living in container?:

Containers fairy easy to get

Fairly popular around the world

To find nice design is straightforward now

Answer to housing crisis:

Should be considered in the mix

Has been an option overseas

Customers come and stay to try it out

Rust?:

Not at all

Containers designed to withstand moving around across the seas

A little surface rust is not gonna hurt

Where find the containers?:

Work through the logistics companies and you can get them there

Base cost?:

44ft shipping container about \$3,700? ex-Melbourne

Fairly cost-effective as building platform

Designed to be delivered

Surplus probably around the world

Approvals?:

in earlier builds more challenges Not insurmountable We probably paved way a little bit (continues but I have to catch bus)
